Obstacles to Ukraine peace remain

Talks continue over Russia's war in Ukraine, but key roadblocks to peace persist

But despite the guarded optimism and friendly banter among the leaders, there was little concrete progress on the main obstacles to peace - and that deadlock likely favors Russian President Vladimir Putin, whose forces continue to make steady, if slow, progress on the ground in Ukraine.

Council to consider

The Pacific Grove City Council will decide Wednesday whether to repeal a recently approved pay raise for its members or place the issue before voters in an election.

The move follows certification of a referendum petition against the new ordinance, which raised councilmember stipends from \$420 to \$966 per month and the mayor's from \$700 to \$1,610. The ordinance was adopted in May but was automatically suspended once the petition was filed.

According to the Monterey County Registrar of Voters, the petition gathered 1,178 valid signatures, exceeding the 10 percent threshold of registered voters required to qualify. Former council member Luke Coletti submitted the petition July 1.

The council has three options: repeal the ordinance outright, call for an election on the referendum, or repeal the ordinance and later pursue a separate ballot measure on council pay. If the council chooses to send the matter to voters, potential election

Zelenskyy has repeatdown with Putin, even challenging the Russian leader to meet him as part of direct peace talks between the two sides in Turkey in May. Putin snubbed that offer, saying that significant progress on an agreement would have to be made before the pair met in person.

On Monday, Trump appeared to back Zelenskyy's plan. "I called President Putin, and began the arrangements for a meeting, at a location to be determined, between President Putin and President Zelenskyy," Trump said in a social media post.

He said he would join the two leaders afterward.

But when discussing a phone call held after the meeting between Trump and the Russian leader, Putin's foreign affairs adviser Yuri Ushakov gave no indication that either a bilateral or a trilateral meeting with Ukraine had been agreed.
